

The Government of Canada has taken significant action to support Canadians and businesses impacted by COVID-19.





"Save" and receive

Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS)

- Temporary subsidy to cover employees' wages between March 15 and June 6, 2020.
- 75% of the first \$58,700 per employee (up to \$847/week)
- Eligibility:
 - Canadian-controlled corporation, non-profit or registered charity
 - Experienced a decrease in revenues by at least 15% (between March 15 and April 11) and 30% (between April 12 and June 6) due to COVID-19
 - Have a business number and payroll program account with CRA
 - Dedicated CEWS Phone Line: 1-833-966-2099

Business Credit Availability Program (BCAP)

- The Government of Canada has introduced the Business Credit Availability Program (BCAP) to help Canadian businesses obtain financing during the current period of significant uncertainty.
- Support access to financing for Canadian businesses in all sectors and regions. Through this program, Export Development Canada (EDC) and the Business Development Bank of Canada (BDC) will provide direct lending and other types of financial support.
- For additional information on any of the BCAP programs or to apply, Businesses should contact their primary lender, where they have a pre-existing relationship.
- Available programs include:
 - The Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA)
 - EDC Loan Guarantee for Small and Medium-Sized Enterprises
 - BDC Co-Lending Program for Small and Medium Enterprises



Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA)

- Up to \$40,000 in interest-free loans to small businesses and not-for-profit companies
- Must have paid between \$20,000 and \$1.5 million in total payroll in 2019 to be eligible.
- Repaying the balance of the loan on or before December 31, 2022 will result in loan forgiveness of 25 percent (up to \$10,000).
- If not paid by December 31, 2022: 3-year term and 5% interest rate

EDC Loan Guarantee for Small and Medium-Sized Enterprises

- Provides credit and cash flow term loans to small and medium-sized enterprises. Canadian businesses in all sectors that were otherwise financially viable and revenue generating prior to the COVID-19 outbreak are eligible to apply.
- It allows financial institutions to issue operating credit and cash flow term loans of up to \$6.25 million to existing clients, with 80 per cent guaranteed by EDC.
- This program is now available at various financial institutions and credit unions.

BDC Co-Lending Program for Small and Medium Enterprises

- Provides term loans for operational and liquidity needs of businesses, which could include interest payments on existing debt. This program is available to businesses that were financially viable and revenue-generating prior to the COVID-19 outbreak.
- The program is designed in three segments to target support to different business sizes.
 - Loans of up to \$312,500 to businesses with revenues of less than \$1 million.
 - Up to \$3.125 million for businesses with revenues between \$1 million and \$50 million.
 - Up to \$6.25 million for businesses with revenues in excess of \$50 million.
- Loans would be interest-only for the first 12 months, with a 10-year repayment period.

BDC – Support for entrepreneurs affected by COVID-19

- Working capital loans of up to \$2 million with flexible terms for a period of up to 6 months, as well as reduced rates on new eligible loans and other forms of industryspecific support.
- How it works:
 - Contact your financial institution for an assessment of your business situation. They'll refer you to an Account Manager at BDC. (Note: If you're already a BDC client, you can reach out to your Account Manager directly and ask for more details.)
 - A BDC representative will get in touch with you to review your situation.

Regional Relief & Recovery Funds - RDAs

- Nearly \$1B in support to affected businesses and communities.
- The Fund will help to:
 - mitigate the financial pressure experienced by businesses and organizations to allow them to continue their operations, including paying their employees;
 - support projects by businesses, organizations and communities to prepare now for a successful recovery.
- This initiative includes two components:
 - \$675 million to support regional economies, businesses, organizations and communities in regions all across Canada;
 - \$287 million to support the national network of Community Futures Development Corporations, which will specifically target small businesses and rural communities across the country.

Sector Specific COVID-19 Support Examples

- Department of Fisheries and Oceans Canada Canadian Seafood Stabilization Fund
 - \$62.5 million new initiative to assist the fish and seafood processing sectors.
 - short-term financing to safely and efficiently process, store, package, and distribute healthy, high-quality products, including adding capacity for your unsold product, and for new technologies to improve productivity and adapt to changing requirements.

- New supports for the agriculture sector:
 - \$75 million to food processors, including meat packers, for ensuring safety of employees (personal protective equipment, adapting to follow protocols, retrofitting factories)
 - Additional \$125 million to the AgriRecovery fund to help pork and beef producers adapt to the crisis and keep animals longer than usual
 - \$200 million for the dairy industry working on a bill
 - \$50 million food recovery program government will purchase food and redistribute to organizations who serve those in need of food
 - Fruit and vegetable producers potential to bring in more foreign temporary workers



Enhanced Work-Sharing Program

- Work-Sharing (WS) is a program that helps employers and employees avoid layoffs when there is a temporary decrease in business activity beyond the control of the employer. The program provides EI benefits to eligible employees who agree to reduce their normal working hours and share the available work while their employer recovers.
- Work-Sharing is an agreement between employers, employees and the Government of Canada.
- Allows Employers to:
 - retain qualified and experienced workers; and,
 - avoid recruiting and training new employees.
- Allows employees to:
 - keep their jobs; and,
 - maintain their work skills.



Enhanced Work-Sharing Program - Eligibility

- Employers:
 - be a year-round business in Canada for at least 1 year
 - be a private business or a publicly held company, or
 - have at least 2 employees in the WS unit
- Eligibility was also extended to:
 - Government Business Enterprises (GBEs), also referred to as public corporations, and
 - not-for-profit employers experiencing a shortage of work due to a reduction of business activity and/or a reduction in revenue levels due to COVID-19
- Employees:
 - be year-round, permanent, full-time or part-time employees needed to carry out the day-to-day functions of the business (your "core staff")
 - be eligible to receive El benefits, and
 - agree to reduce their normal working hours by the same percentage and to share the available work
- Eligibility was also extended to:
 - employees considered essential to the recovery and viability of the business can now be eligible to participate in Work-Sharing (such as technical employees engaged in product development, outside sales agents, marketing agents, etc.)



How to apply for Work-Sharing

To apply for the Work-Sharing program, employers must submit:

- Form EMP 5100 Application for a Work-Sharing Agreement
- Form EMP 5101 Attachment A: Work-Sharing Unit Attachment



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

Accelerated Growth Service (AGS)

- Innovation Canada program that helps growth-oriented Canadian businesses expand by helping them access
 the key government services
- Innovation Advisors use their extensive network of contacts to help businesses find, and take advantage of, everything that government can do for them such as financing, exporting, innovation and business advice
- Eligibility: incorporated Canadian companies with year-over-year revenue growth, generating at least \$5 million annually, and demonstrate the capacity and willingness to keep growing. Important criteria:
 - Creating jobs
 - Exporting globally
 - Growing fast
 - Promoting sustainability
 - Fostering innovation
- Core Partners: NRC-IRAP, Global Affairs Canada, EDC, BDC, the Regional Development Agencies (RDAs), and Innovation Canada (ISED)

Innovation Canada Funding

- Innovative Solutions Canada
 - Up to \$150,000 for proof of concept and up to \$1 million for a prototype (if approved) for specific government "challenges"
 - Testing Stream replaces Build in Canada Innovation Program (BCIP)

- Strategic Innovation Fund
 - 5 streams
 - Stream 1: R&D & Commercialization
 - Stream 2: Firm Expansion and Growth

 - Stream 5: National Ecosystems
 - \$10M minimum funding request

- Regional Economic Development through Innovation (<u>REGI</u>) "Business Scale-up and Productivity"
 - assist high-growth firms to scale up and expand;
 - support technology demonstration and the commercialization of new technologies;
 - encourage the early adoption or adaptation of leading-edge technologies and processes to improve productivity; and
 - increase businesses' capacity to grow through market diversification and entry into global markets.
 - Be aware of regional nuances.



National Research Council (NRC)

- Industrial Research Assistance Program (IRAP):

 - Flagship program to cover IRAP-eligible activities
 80% grant contribution to internal technical salaries & 50% to sub-contractor costs
- Youth Employment Program
 - Hire individual (15-30 years of age), post-secondary graduate
 - Canadian citizen, permanent resident or person granted refugee status
 - legally entitled to work according to the relevant provincial legislation
 - first-time participant in program
- Contribution-to-Organization
 - Funding provided to third-party research organizations (e.g., post-secondary institutions) to undertake small, directed research projects for private sector companies
- Technical Advisory Services
 - World-class infrastructure and network of researchers at NRC facilities across the country

Government Support – treat it like an investor

- There will be extensive due diligence just like an angel or a VC investor - the better prepared you are, the easier the process.
- Most programs want to see the same things:
 - Incorporated with full-time employees (T4s)
 - An addressable market that you have engaged
 - A plan for growth with a workable business model
 - Competent staff management, technical, BD, financial
 - A plan to hire where missing
 - Benefits to Canada/province



Elements of The Plan/Project

- Industry Description size, number of sectors, key customers/competitors, growth potential, regulations, etc.
- Business Description products/services, facilities/assets, management team, growth plans, etc.
- Opportunities what would drive the adoption of your product and generate demand?
- Development/Production Plan you will need to include timelines, milestones and budgets for this this is what the agencies would base the funding allocations off.
- Commercialization how do you plan to sell/generate the revenue in your forecasts?
- Financials forecasts, financial statements, amount of funding required.
- Benefits to Canada this is where you will need to spell out what benefits are derived from providing the funding e.g., creation of jobs, development of export markets in particular, the clean tech/green market.



What motivates government funders?

- "Projects" that align to agency/department mandate/eligibility.
- Investment to pay your part of a project (25-50%).
- Don't make claims that you can't support the upfront and honest approach works best.
- Think of a project in holistic terms where different agencies may have a role to play everyone can see the big picture.
- If you can't spend what was agreed to let them know as soon as possible so the money can be repurposed.
- With a claiming model, get your claims in on time.
